



# ICONIC DULUTH PARKS

These areas are the best for short walks with amazing photo opportunities. They are all public trails open to recreational activities. Some sites have interpretive kiosks to introduce you to key features.



Rising above Duluth's West End on a site once called Grand Mountain, the park was developed on land purchased with money donated by West End furniture dealer Bert Enger in 1921. Today the park includes the American-Japanese Peace Bell, a gift from Duluth's sister city of Ohara-Isumi, and serves as a popular location for weddings.

Trailhead is located on Skyline Parkway and 16th Avenue West.

Located in the East End of Duluth, Lester Park features 9+ miles of hiking and mountain biking trails between Amity Creek and Lester River. Seven Bridges Road follows along Amity Creek and the creek spills out into Lake Superior at the Limnology Building maintained by the University of Minnesota Duluth.

Trailhead can be found on Superior Street and Lester River Road or London Road and the start to Highway 61.
